## **ROSE SHOW RULES**

- 1. All blooms entered into competition in this show must have been grown in the exhibitor's own outdoor garden.
- 2. All entries must
  - a. Have an entry tag with <u>at least</u> the variety name (or an "accepted synonym"), the exhibitor's name, and the class number on the entry tag. Official American Rose Society (ARS) entry tags will be provided by the Rhode Island Rose Society Show for this purpose.
  - b. Be exhibited under one name only, either as an individual or as a team.
- 3. Judging and exhibiting will be in accordance with the current guidelines, rules and regulations of the ARS including the "Step Back" procedure which allows judges to exhibit in shows which they are judging.
- 4. Approved names and classes will be governed by these approved publications:
  - a. Modern Roses
  - b. Official List of Approved Exhibition Roses
  - c. Handbook for Selecting Roses
  - d. Recent Registrations on the ARS web site e. The on-line Modern Roses database which <u>takes precedence</u> over all other publications, if available.

(In cases where a variety is not listed in any of the above official ARS publications, the Combined Rose List may be used as a reference.)

- f. When a rose is entered under an "accepted synonym," (impro- perly named), if Show staff notice this, they will correct its name, and re-place it, so that it can be judged.
- g. **Misclassed** Entries that contain an incorrect class on the entry tag shall, if practicable, be moved to the proper class and the Class be re-judged. <u>Otherwise</u>, it will be disqualified.
- 5. Registration of a rose is not required for exhibiting, but the exhibition name must be recognized in 'single quotes' in the approved publications.
- 6. An exhibitor may have more than one entry in a class, unless other- wise stated in this schedule, provided each entry is of a different variety (cultivar) or grouping of varieties.
- 7. Exhibitors must use containers furnished by the RIRS unless other- wise specified in the schedule. **Use of oasis or any other foam-like material is strongly discouraged.**
- 8. One entry tag per exhibit is needed regardless of the number of roses. They must be correctly and completely filled out and placed

on each exhibit. Tags will be available on the day of the show. Once an exhibit is entered, only designated members of the Show Committee may remove the tag.

For Challenges & Collections: When the schedule calls for multiple specimens displayed in separate containers, each container should have its own entry tag. However, one entry tag is sufficient if all the roses in the entry are the same variety.

- 9. All entries must be on the display tables in correct alphabetical placement within designated class, by 10:15 a.m. After 10:15 a.m. placement will be done only by designated show clerks. Worktables must be cleared by 10:30 a.m.
- 10. Exhibitors will not touch the entries of others. The Show Committee can provide placement assistance; however, exhibitors are responsible for errors.
- 11. Climbing sports of hybrid teas, grandifloras, floribundas, polyanthas, hybrid perpetuals and teas must be shown in the section for non-climbing counterparts of the same variety, not in the section for climbers. They should be disbudded if appropriate to the class.
- 12. Where necessary, classes may be subdivided at the discretion of show chairperson or judges.
- 13. No containers are to be removed from the trophy table without permission from the show chairperson. No entry may be removed from the show until closing.
- 14. Awards of certificates and ribbons are given to entries based on merit: First (blue), Second (red) and Third (green) in each section. Honorable Mention (white) may be awarded at the discretion of the judges.
- 15. The decisions of the judges are final.
- 16. The show chairperson reserves the right to make impromptu decisions relative to the intent of the show rules.
- 17. Exhibitors who interfere with judging in any way will have their exhibits disqualified.
- 18. The Rhode Island Rose Society is not liable for losses or damages to exhibits.
- 19. No pets are allowed at the rose show.
- 20. A limited number of tables are available for set-up. Exhibitors, especially those arriving late, are encouraged to bring their own tables for set-up. Show properties are available on a first come, first served basis.

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## **EXHIBITOR'S INSTRUCTIONS**

- All specimen roses will be placed on the exhibit tables in alphabetical order for each general class.
- Each rose variety will constitute a class.
- A rose or roses will be judged against the merits of the variety.
- Ribbons will be awarded each variety based upon the determination of the judges.
- No award is required for any class or individual rose.
- The decision of the judges shall be final in determining the merits of individual roses and the awarding of ribbons.

## **DISQUALIFICATIONS**

- **Misnamed**. The name of the rose is neither the variety name given on the entry tag nor an accepted synonym thereof.
- Unlabeled or Mislabeled. Entry lacks an entry tag or the exhibitor's name, the class number, and/or the name of the variety is not given on the entry tag.
- A **foreign substance** that has been applied to enhance the beauty of the entry.
- Exhibitor's name visible, if not corrected before the entry is judged.
- An entry that was not grown outdoors.; an entry that was not grown by the exhibitor
- Violation of show rules, specifically:
  - **a.** A **challenge class or collection** entry that does not satisfy the composition and/or staging requirements of the class in which it is entered. **b.** An entry in a class with **restricted eligibility** that the exhibitor is not eligible to enter. **c.** When expressly prohibited by the show rules, entries made in the name of an **absent exhibitor**.
  - d. Unless expressly permitted by the show rules, separate entries from the same garden by two or more exhibitors.
  - e. Unless expressly permitted by the show rules, multiple entries of the same variety by the same exhibitor in the same class.

## **Old Garden Roses**

Old garden roses may be exhibited with or without side buds. They include alba, Bourbon, centifolia, China, damask, foetida, gallica, hybrid multiflora, hybrid perpetual, moss, noisette, Portland, spinosissima, and teas as well as others listed in ARS and other approved publications. See rule 4.

## Class 13: Old Garden Rose, Prior to 1867 (Dowager)

Old garden roses in existence prior to 1867. Date of introduction on the entry tag is very important.

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#### ROSE SHOW FLORAL DESIGN RULES

- 1. Design classes are open to any member of the public with the exception of the judges' class.
- 2. Each class is limited to 4 entries with the exception of the miniature and novice classes, which are allowed 6. Exhibitors may enter as many classes as desired, but only one exhibit per class. Reservations are required in all classes before June 9 to insure table space. Contact Patsy Cunningham: (401) 297-6845 or <a href="mailto:patsycoogynamicoogyn
- 3. Entries must be placed during Friday evening set-up or between 7:00 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. on the morning of the show and re-moved at 4:00 p.m.
- 4. Each entry must be the work of the exhibitor. Outdoor-grown roses must be used in all arrangements but need not be grown by the exhibitor. Florist roses are not allowed and will be cause for disqualification. Full size and/or miniature/miniflora roses may be used in any arrangement unless otherwise specified in the schedule for that class. Roses must be correctly named on the provided entry tag in accordance with ARS rules. Our exception to this is that the use of seedlings is allowed in a design if it is identified as such.

- 5. The rose must be the dominant flower in all arrangements. Other flowers and foliage may also be used if not prohibited in the schedule. Dried or preserved material may be included. No artificial flowers or foliage are permitted. Fresh plant material may not be painted or dyed. Neither plants on the conservation lists nor live creatures are permitted. The American flag or the flag of any country may not be used.
- 6. Bases and accessories are allowed in all classes unless prohibited in the schedule. Backdrops or drapes may be used but must fit in the allotted space as set forth in the schedule.
- 7. Reasonable care will be taken, but the Show Committee and the RIRS are not responsible for loss or damage to arrangements or containers.
- 8. All arrangements are to be the exhibitor's interpretation of the class title. If an exhibitor chooses or if the schedule requires, a 3" x 5" card may accompany each arrangement to assist observers in their interpretation of the design.
- 9. Entries will be judged by an ARS arrangements judge in cooperation with Federated Garden Club judges. First, second, third, and honorable mention ribbons will be awarded in each class.
- 10. If the roses in the exhibit have been grown by the arranger, "AG" must be written on the entry tag. Arrangements composed of arranger-grown roses are eligible to compete for ARS Medal Certificates. Only blue-ribbon winners scoring more than 92 by the judges are eligible per ARS rules.
- 11. An additional award for the best floral art exhibit will be determined by "People's Choice" ballot.

## **ROSE ARRANGEMENTS DIVISION**

Exhibitors are allowed to enter one arrangement per class. Class 38 is limited to exhibitors who have not won a blue ribbon in an arrangement class. Class 40 is limited to the arrangement judges of the show. Entries will be staged within standard trifold backdrops which are grouped around a round table. This includes class 35, which additionally has 18" stands.

A traditional mass, line-mass or line design reflecting the theme, utilizing miniature and miniflora roses. Arrangement may be no larger than 12" in any direction.
